The Winnetka Neighborhood Council PWT Committee holds its regular meetings on the fourth Monday of every month and may also call any additional required special meetings in accordance with the Winnetka NC Bylaws and the Brown Act. The agenda for a regular or special meeting is posted for public review within Winnetka, 91306, at the following location: **Winnetka Recreation Center**, 8401 Winnetka Ave.; and might also be posted at: **Winnetka Bowl**, 20122 Vanowen St., **Express Pack & Ship**, 7657 Winnetka Ave., **Fulton Cleaners**, 20109 Roscoe Blvd., **Gil's Barber Shop**, 20433 Sherman Way.

The public may comment on a specific item listed on this agenda when the Committee considers that item. When the Committee considers the agenda item entitled "Public Comments," the public has the right to comment on any matter that is not specifically listed on this agenda yet is within the Committee's jurisdiction. The public is requested to fill out a "Speaker Card" to address the Committee on any agenda item before the Committee takes an action. The Speaker Card ensures that each speaker's name is complete and correct in the meeting's Minutes. Public Comment is limited to 2 minutes per speaker, but the Committee has the discretion to modify the amount of time for any speaker. Before a Committee vote on any item, any member of the public who has not filled out a Speaker Card will be accorded 1 minute to make a statement. This period will last no longer than 5 minutes total.

 - Discussion and possible action as to filling committee vacancy and/or Vice Chair.
- 5. Annual Spring Clean event:** Discussion (Uebersax) [15 min]
 - Follow up plan for certificates, Lessons Learned, etc.
 - Planning for 2019: Need to determine possible dates. "Earth Day" of April 22 is a Monday, the day after Easter, and Passover begins Friday April 19 (through Saturday, April 27) so that makes April 20th unlikely.
 - Budget: While the preliminary Budget for 2018-2019 was determined by the WNC Board, we may revisit what is proposed, for additional consideration and refinement.
- 6. Bureau of Street Services (BSS) Pothole Blitz:** Discussion and Action (Uebersax) [15 min]
 - BSS will have a Small Asphalt Repairs (SAR) truck returning to Winnetka to perform small asphalt repairs on Thursday, August 9.
 - As usual, we are invited to submit a list of 15 nominations for consideration.
 - These may be pulled from our existing list, and/or include new items, to be added to our list, and used for tracking purposes.

- 7. Winnetka Avenue issues:** WNC and PWT continues to pursue action relating safety issues on Winnetka, particularly between Victory and Vanowen. (Uebersax) [15 min]
- For many years, there have been concerns by stakeholder (particularly residents on the West side), impacted by the striping for a third lane of traffic, at the time of a bridge retrofitting project aided by a Federal grant secured by the LA Dept. of Transportation.
 - Not only did they lose parking for much of the day, this also has prevented the installation of Bike Lanes, as long planned.
 - Particularly since the bicycle fatality last year, there has been progress made in building a case for remedying these issues.
 - The lack of controlled crossing has also been noted.
 - The LADOT has contacted WNC, prior to scheduling informational meetings in the neighborhood (Woodland Hills-Warner Center NC represents part of this stretch).
 - WNC Board has endorsed PWT Motions for action relating to all these issues. As such, we will work to help LADOT with its immediate outreach, and as resulting plans come together, invite staff to make presentations for this Committee, and the Board.

PROCESS FOR RECONSIDERATION

The Board may reconsider and amend its action on items listed on the agenda if that reconsideration takes place immediately following the original action or at the next regular meeting. The Board, on either of these two days, shall: (1) Make a Motion for Reconsideration and, if approved, (2) hear the matter and Take an Action.

If the motion to reconsider an action is to be scheduled at the meeting following the original action, then two items shall be placed on the agenda for that meeting: (1) A Motion for Reconsideration on the described matter and (2) a {Proposed} Action should the motion to reconsider be approved. A Board member who has previously voted on the prevailing side of the original action taken can only make a motion for reconsideration.

If a motion for reconsideration is not made on the date the action was taken, then a Board member on the prevailing side of the action must submit a memorandum to the Secretary identifying the matter to be reconsidered and a brief description of the reason(s) for requesting reconsideration at the next regular meeting. The aforesaid shall all be in compliance with the Brown Act.

PROCESS FOR FILING A GRIEVANCE

Any grievance by a Stakeholder must be submitted in writing to the Secretary of the Board of Directors. The Secretary shall then within no more than 30 days refer the matter to an ad-hoc grievance panel comprised of 3 Stakeholders who are randomly selected by the Council Secretary from a list of Stakeholders who have previously expressed an interest in serving from time to time on such a grievance panel. The Secretary will coordinate a time and a place, not to exceed 10 days, for the panel to meet with the person(s) submitting a grievance and to discuss ways in which the dispute may be resolved.

Thereafter, a panel member shall promptly prepare a written report to be forwarded by the Secretary to the Board to be heard at the next board meeting outlining the panel's collective recommendations for resolving the grievance. The Board of Directors may receive a copy of the panel's report and recommendations prior to any meeting by the Board, but the matter shall not be discussed among the Board members until the matter is heard at the next regular meeting of the Board pursuant to the Ralph M. Brown Act.

This formal grievance process is not intended to apply to Stakeholders who simply disagree with a position or action taken by the Board at one of its meetings. Those grievances can be aired at the Board meetings. This grievance process is intended to address matters involving procedural disputes, e.g., the Board's failure to comply with the Board's Rules or Bylaws, or its failure to comply with the City's Charter, the Plan, local ordinances, state law, and/or federal law.

In the event that a grievance cannot be resolved through this grievance process, the complainant has the right to appeal the matter to the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment for consideration or dispute resolution.
